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Bed Bath & Shower Aides

Are you bedbound and wish you could get a shower? Well thanks to the product below it's now possible.



The "Inflatable EZ Bathe" system accommodates people up to 6'2" and when inflated rests on the bed. The patient needs to be transported off the bed while the tub is put in place. An intake and

drainage valve allows water to come from up to 25 feet away and drain into a tub, toilet, or waste-can nearby. The heavy duty vinyl allows a bruise-free shower with water. It's a great way to get clean without leaving your bed. Soaking is made easy with this product! You can adjust where the water goes by putting pillows or blankets underneath the bathe so certain areas can soak and the head stays above the water.



For those who would prefer just a shower here are two products that may help. The first is an "Inflatable EZ Shower Basin". This basin inflates and allows the caregiver to easily wash the hair. The basin does not come with an air pump so you'll have to pump it up manually.



Another accessory for the bathing system is a water holder. This holder has a hose attached to it for easy water control and contains up to 2.5 gallons of water. It conveniently hangs from an I.V. pole or bedpost.

These products are available from many medical supply companies such as CareMedical, The Wright Stuff, Inc. and Access at Home, Inc. The cost for the bath tub starts at about \$300 while the additional basin and water holder run about \$25-\$40 each.

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Message from Board President by Dave Peery

MSSP turned 61 this year and Candyce Hayes, your Executive Director, has been at the helm for eighteen of those years although she doesn't look a day over 35. Like most organizations we have had our ups and downs over the years, mostly centering around the same thing that affects you and me (money). It's a human condition and never changes, no matter how much you have...and we are NOT going to talk about it.

Today I want to talk about what really makes our organization go; the people that have dedicated themselves to helping the MS community. Your Board of Directors is made up of nine women and men who give their time and effort toward sustaining what we have and improving the organization, wherever we can. And then there are the volunteers, those kind folks who come out and do what needs to be done. Without them we would never reach our goals and for that we are extremely thankful

I could sit here and write all day about Candyce and the extraordinary effort she contributes toward MSSP on a daily basis and I could tell you about Kaisa, who is proving invaluable in helping the organization grow. But I won't. I am simply going to give you three examples of what happens around the MS house every day and the caring solutions that this fantastic staff comes up with to help people in need.

- A state caseworker, Donna, called with an urgent request. Donna described a client in NE Portland that desperately needed to escape an abusive spouse. The client had family out of state where she could relocate. The caseworker found monies to purchase the bus ticket but discovered funds could not be used to transport the client to the bus station. The bus was leaving in two days. Donna asked if MSSP could help get the client to Greyhound. Within minutes we responded with a YES! The caseworker was amazed and delighted. Early that Saturday morning MSSP staff called Radio Cab to verify the client was scheduled for pick up. While we (caseworker & MSSP staff) may never meet, we created a bridge to take the client to her new, safe life.
- Another client called to say her job required a lot of walking and she felt without a scooter she would lose her job. Within 24 hours her husband picked up a free scooter from the MSSP medical equipment loan closet enabling the client to keep her job and her mobility.
- A hospital social worker contacted MSSP to say a client/patient needed prism glasses and lacked financial resources or insurance. We researched the glasses and purchased them online from a medical equipment vendor. Within weeks the client's new glasses were delivered to his doorstep.

In the midst of their daily work, Candyce and Kaisa have always found the time to help.

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MS Brain Games

Partnering with Microsoft and Bayer, the National MS Society created online games to help with brain power. As we learned at the March 27th workshop, we are losing brain power every day. To help MSers with cognitive learning, www.MyMSMyWay.com created free online games just for MSers to help increase brain power as we learn new things. The research team, including MS healthcare professionals, created games that provide fun and interactive challenges.

To ensure that the games are accessible to the MS community, technical modifications were developed. This includes minimal mouse and keyboard movement. Many of the games only use two keyboard keys for all actions. The appearance also helps as the font is large and the colors are bright.

According to the National MS Society, approximately 50% of the people with MS have cognitive difficulties. Sites, such as www.MyMSMyWay.com, www.fitbrains.com, and www.lumosity.com, offer free games that are easy to play while increasing memory, focus, and problem-solving. This information is based on findings from on-going studies.

You and Your Bladder!


